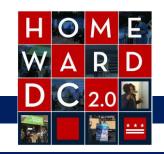

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Budget Cuts & Fiscal Constraints



Purpose:

Determine how to best have a productive conversation on this front?

Background or Context:

- We have known for almost a year (since the June 2023 ICH Full Council meeting) that we have significant
 - Downward pressures on District revenues and
 - Upward pressures on District costs/budgets.
- Also know the Mayor's Proposed Budget generally drops end of March/early April, so we have limited window for feedback to DHS
- Additional opportunities to provide feedback Mayor Bowser has announced schedule for Annual Budget Engagement Forums

Feedback:

AW(YAB/CEWG): Recommend focusing on subsystems that need the most attention and/or specific programs such as ERAP.

Other Comments/Q&A:

- Q (RB, PFFC/CEWG): First point is what is causing the downward pressures vs what costs are we seeing increase with this understanding can help with the give and take that we would need to make concerning reductions?
 - A (from ICH): Downward pressures related to revenue, specifically retail and commercial. In terms of increasing costs, understanding there were a number of upward pressures. Likely most appropriate to leverage Mayor's forums.
 - **RB**: In terms of programs, need to look at seniors/aging with consideration to PSH and look out for PIT results to check disparity in resources for Singles. From advocacy perspective, would be helpful to know ballpark figure of how revenue is tied to funding for homeless services.



Notes on Budget Cuts & Fiscal Constraints



Feedback/Other Comments/Q&A:

- RW (PFFC/CEWG): Are we commenting on proposed budget cuts? Reflections from testimony last week at DHCD performance hearing and status of Housing Production Trust Fund. Need to define what adequate services in the system.
 - A (from ICH): There are no proposed budget cuts at this point, but the Mayor is holding budget engagement forums, so anticipating cuts.
- * **KSM (COH):** There also feels like there are two stages: 1. Cuts that are going into effect as of April for the rest of this fiscal year and 2. Next fiscal year.
- CE (DCCADV): Are other agencies also making cuts? With the 5% external (that is, program) cuts from DHS, I was curious if other agencies who are being asked to cut are also cutting programs. Or if they are making internal agency cuts as well/instead. Worried about accepting that human services cuts is how we are going to get through a revenue decrease I think all the subsystem needs are critical and would love to see if we can take an alternative approach to worse outcomes for our most marginalized residents.

Feedback/Other Comments/Q&A:

- CC (Unity): Echo Robert's comments on returning back to usual budget pressures as pandemic era funding phases down. There were so many effective programs to leverage lessons learned including,
 - How to effectively care for really vulnerable population in time of crisis. Worry that momentum to two non-congregate sites (NCS) is slowing down.
 - > PSH Plus for older and medically vulnerable individuals with needed medical and mental health supports on site, short of assisted living.
- RB (PFFC/CEWG): One additional thing to point out is the non congregate momentum will affect the conversation about the replacement of Harriet Tubman and I am concerned about that as well.
- * **RP (DHS):** Re: NCS There is not a lack of momentum from DHS perspective as continue contracts and progress on renovations. Aston is still set to open this summer. E Street will likely be pushed back to October to allow for ramp up and so not opening two new sites at the same time.




2022 Nominations



- Overview: For expired seats at the end of 2022.
- Status: Under Council Review.
 - Individual resolutions can be tracked through LIMS.
 - \triangleright Anticipate approval, pending Council Review by 03/10.

Special Notes:

- > To make up for the delay in approval, terms for this cohort will end May 1, 2025.
- > One candidate has since moved from their provider role. ICH to identify replacement from 2023 Provider category candidates.




2023 Nominations



- Overview: For the eleven (11) vacant and expired seats at the end of 2023, including
 - 2 Advocate
- 2 Business/Private Sector
 5 Provider
- 2 Lived Experience

- Status: Under MOTA Review.
- Highlights: ICH distributed profiles of 2023 Nominees. **
 - 7 of 11 nominees identify as people of color.
 - 3 re-appointed members, 8 new members.
 - 3 individuals currently serve as ICH CMTE/WG Co-Chairs.
 - Lived Experience (LE): In addition to the 2 LE seats, 2 people with LE were selected to serve in other categories (Provider and Advocate). Total of 6 LE members, including 2 women.




Feedback & Q&A:

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



1. Coordination Across the ICH



Proposed Projects

- Planning for and tracking efforts to meet locally and federally legislated mandates, including:
 - > Comments to the Mayor's Proposed Budget (annual),
 - Strategic Plan (every 5 years) and Updates (annual),
 - Community-wide assessments and inventories including Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), Point-in-Time (PIT) and Housing Inventory Counts (HIC), and Homeless Youth Census (annual)
 - > Input on federally mandated applications and plans (annual), and
 - Winter Plan (Annual)
- Tracking key issues/concerns surfacing across ICH forums, including:
 - > Identifying and reviewing key concerns surfacing across ICH Forums,
 - > Triaging emerging key concerns to appropriate ICH Forum and alerting relevant agencies for attention and support, and
 - > Following up to ensure that key concerns are addressed within the appropriate timeframes.
- Supporting essential ICH governance functions, including
 - > Issuing annual call for nominations to identify and rank candidates for expiring or vacant Community Seats on Full Council
 - Regularly reviewing and updating ICH Bylaws to ensure they track critical shifts in the landscape, including necessary changes to the ICH infrastructure



2. Additional Key Priorities



Proposal to focus projects on

- Addressing Fiscal Constraints
- Expanding Income including Employment and Entrepreneurship Opportunities
 - It's been a goal for a long time!
 - > Work time for this is critical, so we can have a devoted conversation. Leveraging breaks is critical.
 - Can we plan a co-meeting with the Workforce Investment Council?
 - Benefit cliffs supporting clients with understanding the impact of increasing income, especially related to Peer Opportunities!

* Regional Coordination and Collaboration

- > Vehicle for supporting clients with ties outside the District has been Project Reconnect
- May be opportunity for more because many of us and our clients have ties/connections and are mobile across the DMV
- > Operationalizing the agreements and coordination, especially around residency requirements
- Lots of practical low hanging fruits how do we identify POC and create a simplified map of the homeless services system in neighboring jurisdictions

Establishing an REI Assessment Tool



Proposed Projects

- Identify and evaluate readily available resources that can be tailored to homeless services, for example the ORE and CORE assessment tools
- Tailor most appropriate racial impact assessment tool to our system
- Develop protocols and pilot provider-level and system-level policies and programming
- Conduct a baseline review of significant policies and programming to determine impact on different racial and ethnic groups
- Adopt and promote standards for continuous and ongoing system-level and provider-level examinations


Proposed Projects:

- Review the TCP/Urban Institute housing insecurity/instability survey
- Work with the District's Office of Planning (OP) to
 - > integrate findings of the housing insecurity/instability survey and
 - estimate level of assistance needed to bring insecure households to stability and appropriately relieve rent-burdened households in District
- Work with the District Housing Authority (DCHA) to understand the gap between
 - > Preliminary estimates on need obtained from working with the OP and
 - > Need that the DCHA can meet given current federal funding levels
- Work with Federal gov to determine if & how the Federal gov can address gap

CONSUMER ENGAGEMENT WORKGROUP PRIORITIES & PROJECTS

Proposed Priorities



- Establishing a comprehensive Consumer Advisory Group (CAG) or Lived Experience Advisory Group (LEAG)
- 2. Mapping client experience and addressing constituent grievances related to homeless services
- Supporting key projects that are vital in addressing constituent concerns



Establishing a Consumer Advisory Group



Projects:

- Identify and secure funding to cover stipends for a minimum of 16 constituents with lived experience (4 for each subsystem – family, singles, veterans, and youth)
- Recruit and onboard the 16 constituents with lived experience once the proposed structure is approved at the appropriate Executive or Full Council meeting focusing on ensuring continuity between the existing Consumer Engagement Workgroup and SHY Youth Advisory Board members.



Mapping Client Experience & Addressing Grievances



- Gather and refer the concerns of constituents with lived experience to the appropriate CMTE/WG forums
- Ensure adequate representation of constituents with lived experience at ICH Forums (Full Council/CMTE/WG meetings) to support the system mapping work underway
- Identify the priority areas for mapping client experience and addressing constituent grievances across the appropriate CMTE/WG meetings



Supporting Key Projects to Address Concerns



- Advancing Housing as a Human Right,
- Ensuring dignity in death,
- Expanding access to food, and
- Developing and implementing Move-On/Graduation strategies from long-term supportive services

- KSM (COH): Would be okay with monthly report out of meetings and WG materials, not weekly.
- * **RB**: Definitely employment and entrepreneurship and regional.
 - Do not let employment services off the hook this is where those who are mention in the plan and those who are votes on full as far as the gov have to help us here.
 - Unfortunately, for this year we have to handle the fiscal constraints but far as a long term priority we need to refer to the employment goal in the plan
- * KSM (COH): Related to employment/entrepreneurship we have not made much progress on this front, so where does this fit in? Is it realistic to keep as CMTE priority?
 - A (from ICH): Have an opportunity to determine how to leverage breaks in meeting schedule to hold focused forums and coordinate with appropriate agencies to advance on this front.





- RE (PFFC/CEWG): Will the DHS peer academy disturb someone's SSI payments? Has anyone looked into that it may end up causing more hardship in the end if there is not an agreement between DHS and Federal gov.
 - A (from DHS): Part of the orientation is to inform individuals for their own decision making to accept or decline payments.
 - A (from Pathways): Also working to pull resources to support for long term planning as people enter into the work force and move to hourly/salary positions.
 - Q (SP, ICH): Are you able to establish something like a temporary estate for individuals, or LLC for individual, so funds can go into the separate account, but they can have access later.?
- * **RP (DHS):** Regarding OMS regional coordination is not as concrete as it may appear.
- * **RB (PFFC/CEWG):** So what about the Hoover building? Are we going to support a Title 5 for our true downtown services center?
- * **RB** (**PFFC/CEWG**): Employment is part of regional coordination because many of the job opportunities are not within DC. Unless we do something special like were any of the people hired for the 801 replacement were retained and where in the region were they placed for assignments after 801 was completed.





- CE (DCCADV): I see Strategic Planning & ERSO Committees have a section on DV "supporting strategic engagement with adjacent systems that impact all subpopulations, particularly Domestic Violence, and Justice-Involved Populations". What are the "Adjacent Systems" for DV that this is referring to?
 - A (from ICH): We know we need better coordination with DV and singles system including adults and young adults, since we have a good model at the front door of the families system. For example, related to immediate needs and temporary housing (under ERSO) do we have the appropriate response and knowledge on how to refer individuals who prefer and/or are best served by DV system. Under Strategic Planning, larger conversation through CAHP on how to support clients experiencing DV to permanent housing resources.





- AP (CHASS): Shared via Webex chat.
 - Regarding employment and entrepreneurship opportunities: How is the ICH working to leverage existing resources and explore new funding opportunities to address homelessness in the district? Can you provide examples of innovative funding strategies or partnerships the ICH has pursued to expand income and support services for individuals experiencing homelessness?
 - Regarding regional coordination and collaboration: How does the ICH collaborate with neighboring jurisdictions and regional stakeholders to address homelessness on a broader scale? What efforts are being made to coordinate services and share best practices with other regional agencies or councils tackling homelessness?
 - Regarding the growing disconnect within organizations: How does the ICH work to foster collaboration and communication among the various organizations and agencies involved in addressing homelessness in the district? What strategies does the ICH employ to address any challenges or barriers to effective coordination and collaboration among stakeholders?
 - Regarding the impact of migrant-related crime: How is the ICH responding to concerns about crime associated with migrant populations experiencing homelessness? What partnerships or strategies are in place to address safety concerns and ensure the well-being of both migrants and the broader community?
 - Coordination of mental health services: How does the ICH collaborate with the Core Service Agency and the Department of Behavioral Health to ensure that individuals experiencing homelessness have access to mental health services? Are there specific initiatives or programs in place to address the mental health needs of individuals living in encampments or affected by gang-related crime?





Overview

- * The 2024 Aspire Incubator Program is a part of the Bowser Administration's continued investment in and support of local businesses.
- * Through the Aspire Incubator Program, which has awarded approximately \$750,000 over the past three years, entrepreneurs have access to a comprehensive range of resources, including mentorship, guidance, and educational training to help turn their business ideas into reality.

Aspire Incubator Program Overview:

- The 2024 Aspire Incubator Program will support 20 DC residents who are returning citizens or justice-impacted individuals looking to start or grow a business.
- Participants in the Aspire Incubator Program will benefit from a community of support, and up to \$5,000 in stipends for completing various business development milestones, covering planning, regulatory compliance, finance, and public speaking.

DSLBD: The Dream Pitch Program



Overview

- * The 2024 Dream Grant Program is part of the Bowser Administration's continued investment in and support of local businesses.
- * The Dream Grant Pitch Program provides financial and technical assistance to entrepreneurs from Wards 7 and 8 and provides a platform to develop the skills needed to run a successful business; over the past three years, local entrepreneurs have received approximately \$1.5 million in Dream grants.

Dream Pitch Grant Program Overview:

- At the heart of the program is the Dream Pitch Competition, offering participants a platform to present their businesses to a panel of judges. The competition includes pitch awards of up to \$7,500. The program spans seven years and focuses on business pitching, accounting and bookkeeping, marketing and branding, and mentorship opportunities.

- The plan includes:
 - Analysis of impediments to fair housing choice across the region and provides
 - Strategies to increase access to safe and affordable housing,
 - Increase investment and resources in priority areas, and
 - Create more inclusive communities.
- * COG will now support jurisdictions as they seek to implement the strategies identified in the plan to prevent housing discrimination and address the root causes of housing inequity in the region.

OSSE: New Funding For District's Advanced Technical Center *NEW*



Overview

- The Office of the State Superintendent of Education (OSSE) received a \$4.1 M Career Connected High School Grant from the Biden-Harris Administration to expand access to the Districts' Advanced Technical Center (ATC).
- The initiative offers dual-credit Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses in high-demand industries to students citywide, including
 - Advanced & Career Ready Internships,
 - General Nursing Program, and
 - Cybersecurity Program.

Advanced Technical Center



OSSE is committed to ensuring DC learners have access to robust and sustainable pathways to a fulfilling career and life by reimagining high school and providing relevant and accessible postsecondary programming. In the 2022-23 school year, OSSE launched the Advanced Technical Center (ATC), the District's first citywide hub for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programming. The ATC enables high school students from across the city to earn college credits and industry certifications while remaining enrolled in their DC public school or public charter school. The ATC's dual enrollment programming prepares students for careers in high-skill, high-wage, in-demand disciplines, such as cybersecurity and general nursing. In Fall 2023, the ATC moved to its new, permanent home: a \$10.3 million facility at Penn Center that includes state-of-the-art science and technology labs for students.



- In the 2023-24 school year, the ATC is serving nearly 200 students from across the city, representing 15 high schools
- Students who took classes at the ATC in the 2022-23 school year attended nearly 13 more days of school than their peers who did not
- During the 2022-23 school year, students attending the ATC earned a total of 740 college credits – worth approximately \$570,000 in tuition – at no cost to students or their families
- 80 percent of students who completed their first two CTE courses during the inaugural year at the ATC returned for the 2023-24 school year

- Construct and open the new ATC at Penn Center, featuring a new welcome center and sophisticated science and technology labs
- Partner with faculty from Trinity Washington University and the University of the District of Columbia to offer coursework within two CTE programs of study, nursing and cybersecurity
- Connect students to paid internships and help them explore post-secondary college and career options
- Transport eligible students to ensure they have safe and timely access to the center when transitioning among the ATC, their high school and home

Cybersecurity Program

The Cybersecurity program of study at the Advanced Technical Center (ATC) will prepare you for entry-level technical and professional careers related to protecting and defending information and systems.

WHAT WILL I LEARN?

- How to monitor and create information systems used around the world
- Discover weaknesses in databases, networks, hardware, firewalls, and encryption

WHERE CAN I WORK?

- This pathway is a fast-growing field in the public and private sectors.
- Cybersecurity professionals can work for local, state, and the federal government, the military, or major private sector companies like Amazon, Meta or Google
- . Technology and the need to keep our data secure will always have a place in our future. Whether you plan to live in DC or across the world, IT jobs can be performed from anywhere.

WHAT CTE COURSES WILL I TAKE AT THE ATC?

- Fundamentals of IT and Cybersecurity I
- Internetworking Technologies
- Digital Forensics
- Network Defense and Counter Measures

WILL I RECEIVE COLLEGE CREDITS?

. Yes! All of our courses are dual credit. You will earn 15 college credits from the University of the District of Columbia and 4 high school credits toward graduation.

HOW WILL I ADVANCE MY CAREER?

- Most cybersecurity careers require some additional postsecondary training from certifications to an associate degree.
- During your first year at the ATC, you will earn the entry-level CompTIA IT Fundamentals certification. During your last course, you will earn the CompTIA Security+ certification.

IS THERE AN INTERNSHIP?

· Yes, you will participate in two paid internships through this pathway.

Advanced & Career Readv Internship Programs



OSSE is committed to ensuring DC learners have access to robust and sustainable pathways to a fulfilling career and life by reimagining high school and providing relevant and accessible postsecondary programming. This includes programs like the Advanced Internship Program (AIP) and Career Ready Internship (CRI), which provide hundreds of DC high school students with paid school-year and summer internship opportunities that count for school credit, are aligned to their career and technical education (CTE) coursework and are in high-demand career fields such as engineering, information technology and health science. A recent effort by Bain & Company on behalf of CityWorks DC found that students who had access to career supports such as connections to employers, exposure to careers, and professional counseling tended to earn wages that were 20 percent higher than their peers who did not have access to these types of programming. The AIP and CRI are an important part of OSSE's larger strategy to increase attendance, improve graduation rates, and prepare students for the futures of their choosing.



MPACT METRICS

- In Summer 2023, 96 percent of students who started in a summer Career Ready Internship completed their full internship (593 students total)
- . In the 2023-24 school year, more than 600 interested high school students applied for the Advanced Internship Program, 243 of whom were successfully placed in internships across 59 host employers - a 23 percent increase in placements from last year and more than tripling the number of placements in the 2021-22 school year.

General Nursing Program

General nurses provide direct patient care, administer doctor-prescribed medications, collect fluid samples, assist physicians with exams, manage electronic medical records, and work to educate patients about medications, treatments, and healthy lifestyles. The General Nursing program of study at the Advanced Technical Center (ATC) prepares you for this high-wage, high-skill and in-demand career and so much more!

WHAT CAN I DO WITH A NURSING BACKGROUND?

· This pathway allows you to explore the broad health science field with many career paths beyond nursing. Jobs in this field include medical assistant, ultrasound technician, paramedic. phlebotomy, and surgical technician.

WHAT ARE MY CAREER PROSPECTS WITH NURSING?

· Overall employment in health science fields is expected to grow 15 percent by 2029, mainly due to an aging population, leading to greater demand for healthcare services.

WHAT CTE COURSES WILL I TAKE AT THE ATC?

- Principles of Health Science
- Medical Terminology
- Anatomy and Physiology I
- · Anatomy and Physiology II or Certified Nursing Assistant

WILL I RECEIVE COLLEGE CREDITS OR SCHOLARSHIPS?

 Yes! All of our courses offer dual credit. You can earn up to 20 college credits from Trinity Washington University and 4 credits toward high school graduation. Students who finish their ATC program even qualify for a \$60,000 scholarship

IS THERE AN INTERNSHIP?

 Yes, you will have the opportunity to participate in two paid internships -- one during the summer and one during the school year.

CAN I EARN INDUSTRY CERTIFICATIONS?

· During your first year, you will earn the American Heart Association's Basic Life Support certification for health professionals. During your second year, you can choose to earn the Certified Nursing Assistant certification or take another academic course in the nursing pathway.


