- ❖ **NS (SSVP):** What is going on with it FRSP? Is it being canceled?
Will people be evicted?
- **TS (ICH):** We can discuss this as part of the first discussion on the FY25 Budget.

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Live Notes on Public Comments



- ❖ **Cat Matthew (Concerned Citizen):** DJ, started business on street. Needed services. Got the flyer of the services here. Diabetes is in now in remission because of a Doctor he connected to there. Now has access to health services and other services available. There are lot of people in the shelter that are very dependent on the system. Everyone has a dream. Will they have regrets if you don't go for it? If you want to help with long term solutions help people start businesses. Are there microgrants? Nutrition is horrible in the shelter.
- ❖ **James Shabazz (Concerned Citizen):** Councilmember Robert White came to the Vigil and blamed the gridlock on a broken system. It was confusing when those services have so much funding. We have solutions. We need a better partnership between those in govt and those with lived experience. We want to work to solve housing and economic problems while waiting in shelter. We ask council members to join us once a month in shelter to meet with people. We want DCHA to create onsite apprenticeship programs in all phases of building maintenance. We urge DC govt to help those in public housing in literacy, we want black contractors. They would train black youth so they are building a skill. We want DC govt and ICH to join in a radical reformation of the DC street vending industry.

Live Notes on Public Comments



- ❖ **Queenie Featherstone (PFFC):** There is a 73-year-old lady in the woods at 26 Penn Ave. Please can some go with me to meet with her. We need to give her a place to live and help her. There are two men, 14th and K, over 75 with no clothes except for shorts at a metro bus stop. Work with me to help them. When you couch surf or stay at someone's home you typically can't stay for more than 30 days. They are sharing it with you. You can't tell a SW you stayed with the Smith Family. The SW will say that is where you live. I slept in my car and the SW said that is where I live. Not literally homeless issues with eligibility for housing programs.
- ❖ **Ms. Naomi (PFFC):** When I think about the term inclusion or fair shot. I am at a loss for words. Or shared sacrifice. These are the intentional phrases that Mayor Bowser uses. I am here to ask for something different then how the ICH works. I get the community and partnership, but I don't get seeing the ACA here once a year. You can't expect different from the community based on your actions.

Live Notes on Public Comments



- ❖ **RW (PFFC):** Working with ICH for 16 years. Most of the advocacy work is around Housing as a Human Right. Attended conference on housing justice and those families being threatened with eviction. We have CEWG which helped formulate REI group and we are working to bring about Universal Housing Rights. The problem right now, Kate said this budget season is over, I don't think the fight is over. The Mayor formed the Council's office on Racial Equity and REI and after seeing George Floyd and the life choked out of him. The life is being choked out of the black folks in DC with the systems in place. They are not equitable. These agencies need to work together. My name was on a DCHA list and if I am getting housed by DHS you should know who I am and make sure I am getting the services I need.
- ❖ **Akoma Love (Concerned Citizen):** It costs me \$35 each way to get here. Everyone one of you need to get out of the office and go talk with people who are homeless. Do any of you have homeless in your home? I am tired, I have been out here since 1989. I have been called to this work. Where are the congregations? God renamed CCNV. Watch Good Samaritan. It was a Black man that founded it. It was Federal City College. That building will be dedicated and attributed to the Black Lives that Matter. When I think about the people I have lost, and I ask why, and the answer is to get your attention. Did you open this meeting with prayer?

Key Discussion Questions



❖ **Q. Are there significant Council enhancements in the following key areas?**

- **Expanding Opportunities:** specific to increasing income, employment, & entrepreneurship
- **Serving Justice Involved & Justice Seeking populations**

 Flag: ICH Work Plan proposes ICH WGs on these topics, but these have yet to be established. So, this presents a blind spot for the ICH Team and Work Plan.


❖ **Q. Are there Opportunities outside the Council Approved FY25 Budget Enhancement we should be tracking?**

Examples of Initiatives we are tracking:

- DC Opportunity to leverage HCVP for families exiting FRSP
- HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO)
- HUD Community Planning and Development (CPD) Grants: CDBG, HOME, RHP, ESG, HOPWA, & HTF

❖ **Q. Are these the right next steps to be discussed across our infrastructure?**

- Is there another way to plan? Or for organizing the work and next steps?

 Flag: It feels repetitive to 1) track budget updates, 2) assess implications and focus priorities/projects, and 3) update the work plan, but planning is iterative, so these iterations may be critical. Also, it feels like a heavy lift, but it is likely important to document how planning work is responsive to shifts in the landscape.

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



- ❖ **NS (SSVP):** I am here as a product of RRH in Philadelphia. I heard about it 10-12 years ago. Everything was canceled, and only RRH was offered, which didn't work. That is not what I wanted or was supposed to get. I was thinking about my future for myself and my children. I wouldn't be here today if it worked. Concerned about the 2200 people that will be exited from FRSP. Why are they still offering FRSP if it is being cut off for other people? Can someone please explain it to me?
- ❖ **RW (DC Council):** I appreciate all of you and am thankful to be here. Everyone knows this is a difficult budget year and we can only work with the funding we have. Council enhancements include 619 LRSP vouchers, an increase in ERAP from \$7mil to \$27 mil, and funding for public housing. We also worked with the chairman on housing vouchers: 100 more, 80 for people experiencing homelessness. We cut funding for truancy, often due to unstable housing, and we used some to fund housing vouchers. The last thing, FRSP is a concern. Little over 2000 families are moving out of the program. DCHA is helping with that, and we will use some vouchers, but many families are still exiting the program. I don't see how we will be in a different position if we continue to put people into FRSP without reform. I want to understand the metrics better and how we evaluate the program's success.

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



❖ **LZ (DHS):** Shared concern about families and FRSP. FRSP is not designed to be long-term; it is short-term. We don't have a voucher for every low-income family. We need to make choices as a community. Most people who do not exit to a voucher are young and able-bodied. With the right supports, they can make it. How do we create FRSP so that if your rent is being taken care of for a year you have supports to be able to be stable at the end of that year. During the pandemic we were extending people for multiple years because people weren't earning, and we had a lot of federal support. Now that time is gone. What are we doing to support people that don't need PSH level support but need affordability? The Mayor did go to DCHA to ask about vouchers, there is a hearing, and the board will vote and if given the permission to use those vouchers then 1 300 families from FRSP will transfer to a voucher. Council has also funded vouchers to support these families. We also need to figure out how to best support people with other programs, like Career Map, so people don't have to chose between support with rent or taking a raise. I know this is a crisis for people, but we are all at this table to figure out how to support. How do we support the growth that we need in the budget? We have some new vouchers, but we are hitting slowdowns because caseloads are full, and many cannot hire up to take on new people. We have the DHS peer support, and we hope that will help build capacity. The first cohort will graduate in August. DOH is doing some work with the Board of Social Work and that is really important so that we can hire people that want to work in the field.

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



- ❖ **TS (ICH):** appreciate the flag for supporting the growth. A significant part of that is economic opportunities. I want some perspective and feedback on Section 3 and available employment opportunities. What can we realistically expect?
- ❖ **RB (SYC):** DOES needs to improve its representation in Strategic Planning, SAS, and CEWG. We can't keep funding homeless people to employment programs that don't fit when they have certifications in other ways. We were somewhat successful with 801, but there should have been a lot more people employed coming out of 801. We have the First Employment Act because we want DC residents to get jobs. When we talk about rehabbing sites or new sites, how many people experiencing homelessness are we employing? What happened to proactive engagement within RRH? We must orient our work plans and budget to the strategic plan. There is a plan with an estimated number of units that we need to be reaching. Why did we not meet that this year?

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



- ❖ **NC (DOES):** One of the recommendations is a bimonthly forum, but not sure if we need to have it as often. We need to focus on action: regular hiring fairs, training, credentialing, and workshops on starting businesses at locations like MLK where we can reach the target population. DOES needs support with housing and helping clients navigate to housing. Our job is job readiness. We connect people with employers. If we can create a forum that supports bringing all the pieces to the table. Someone provides clothing, and someone offers transportation and DOES employment. We need to connect all the services for people. We create a map or a pathway we can hand to people.
- ❖ **RE (PFFC):** I sit here, very grateful for my growth but sad about those in the unhoused population. My daughter is in RRH and getting a job. She is fine, but in DC, you need a career to be able to pay rent. If we had childcare and training that came with RRH, that would help you be sustainable. We need to raise the ceiling of what you can make. I have to resign from my jobs so I can keep my housing voucher. I am in the process of transferring from LRSP to federal.

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



- ❖ **BB (DBH):** Completely agree that we all need to be a part of the continuum of services. Within DBH we offer supported employment services. All services are free or paid by Medicaid. You can call the Access Helpline and get connected to services. Call 1-888-7 WE HELP or call 988. We have an urgent care clinic at 35 K St. You can get services on demand. We have the stabilization center at 35 K. We have served almost 3000 people since October 31st. We have transportation support. There are a lot of services available, and we need to get those services out to people. We are resource-rich but communication-poor. One thing really important about supported employment is the array of services. We help people figure out what they want to do and how to get there, and we do follow-along services to help people keep their jobs.
- ❖ **TS (ICH):** Hearing the comment from RE that people need a career. How do we get staffing to meet capacity needs?
- ❖ **KSM (COH):** DHS has been listening and working to reduce barriers to hiring case managers. Now working to create a pipeline, especially for people with lived experience. Need to follow up with the social work board and legislation. Studies show racial disparities in the outcomes of the licensing test. How do we ensure we are hiring qualified people without the license?

Live Notes on Council Enhancements



- ❖ **RD (DOH):** No updates on the social work board and the licensure process. We are working to create a scholarship program. We want to remove barriers in the process. I challenge us at the table to figure out how we can bridge funding to increase its impact.
- ❖ **RB (SYC):** Emphasis on placement and retention to secure a person's employment and ability to pay rent. There are 15,309 vacant units, and over 6,226 are luxury units. How do we get people into those units? We need to match up employment and housing and consider retention. We can't just focus on 5 employment industries but look at 6-50. What can we increase the minimum wage to? Housing costs are outpacing pay.
- ❖ **TS (ICH):** Clarification that these vacant units are not dedicated to homeless services and funded by PSH. We have looked at the data on PSH units. We are hearing from DCHD about vacancy losses but not vacant units. So, the question of vacant markets and luxury units is larger than that of homeless services.
- ❖ **VP (DHCD):** Clarification that the vacancies Director Green referred to in the 06/17 ICH Housing Solutions Committee meeting are economic, meaning people are in them but are not paying rent.
- ❖ **TS (ICH):** Question to the Office of the City Administrator (OCA) and Deputy Mayor for Planning and Economic Development (DMPED): Are we supporting the development of market and luxury units with public dollars that allow us to make asks regarding vacancies? Can we support future development in a way that ensures minimizes vacancies?

Re-Envisioning ICH Engagements

Purpose – To account for constituent feedback received related to

- ❖ Opportunities for informing Mayor’s Proposed Budget instead of commenting on the Mayor’s Proposed Budget
- ❖ Minimizing ICH-specific budget engagement sessions and
- ❖ Maximizing efficiency by leveraging council budget hearings to meet the legislated mandate for comments

Goal – To leverage existing processes and minimize new/additional commitments!

Potential Models for Early Engagement:

- ❖ ICH support on HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to identify priorities based on unmet needs and rank new and renewing projects based on performance
- ❖ Mayor’s citywide budget engagement events for community input tailored to prioritizing homeless services resources.

Potential Strategy for Leveraging Council Budget Hearing to Minimize ICH-specific Budget Engagements

- ❖ Focus on guidance and support to community members to track and attend relevant Council Budget Hearings
- ❖ Identify and document comments relevant to homeless services submitted to relevant Council Budget Hearings
- ❖ Call ICH recess during Council Budget Hearings to minimize strain on stakeholders

Live Notes on ICH Budget Engagement Debrief



- ❖ **TS (ICH):** Flagging areas for feedback and follow-up, including
 - Re-envisioning ICH engagements related to the budget. Call for early engagement to inform Mayor's Proposed Budget and minimal engagements during budget oversight by leveraging existing engagements, namely Agency Roadshows and Council hearings.
 - Special Session on HUD CoC NOFO on 06/25 to inform priorities for funding and ranking process.

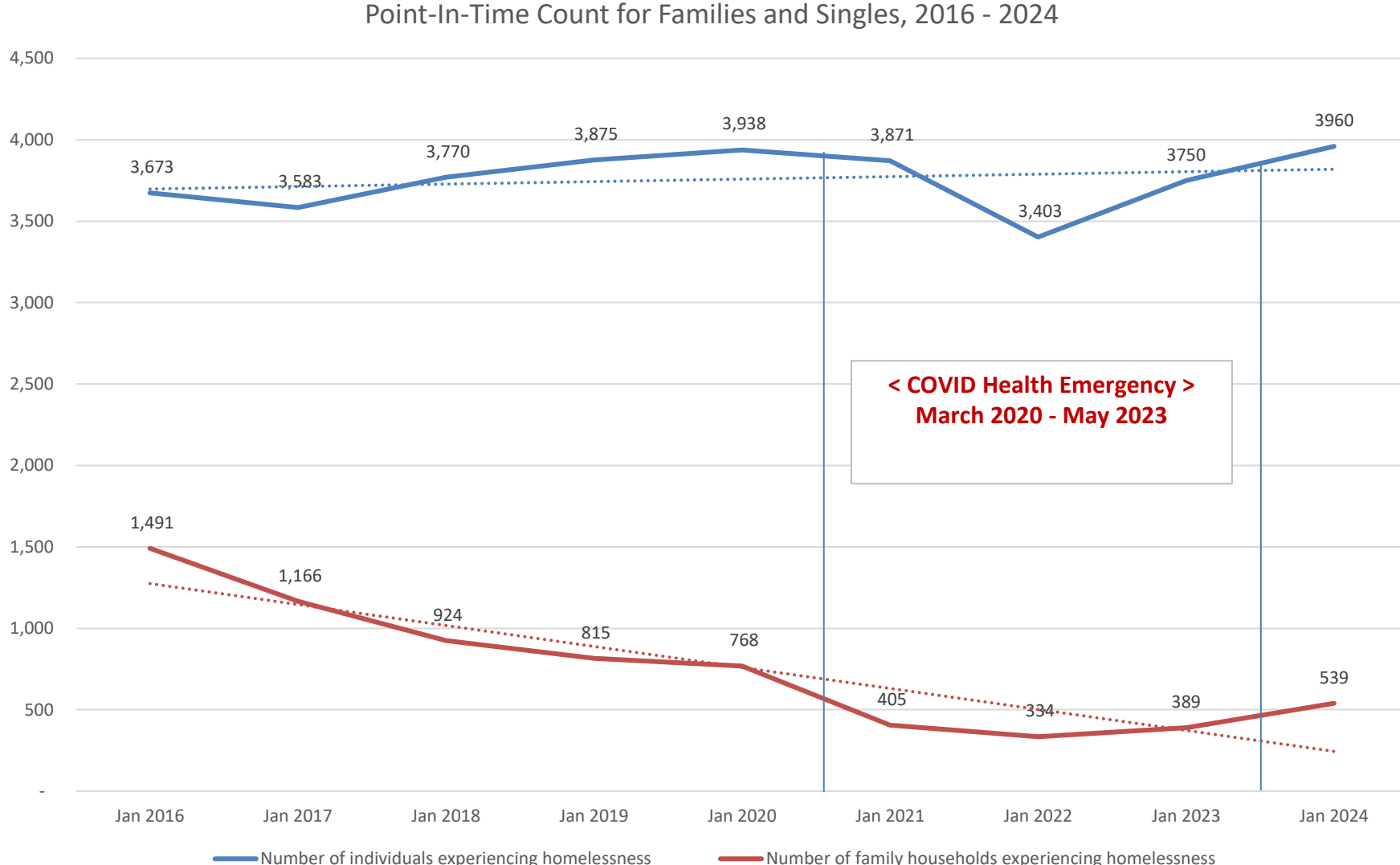

 March 2020 - May 2023



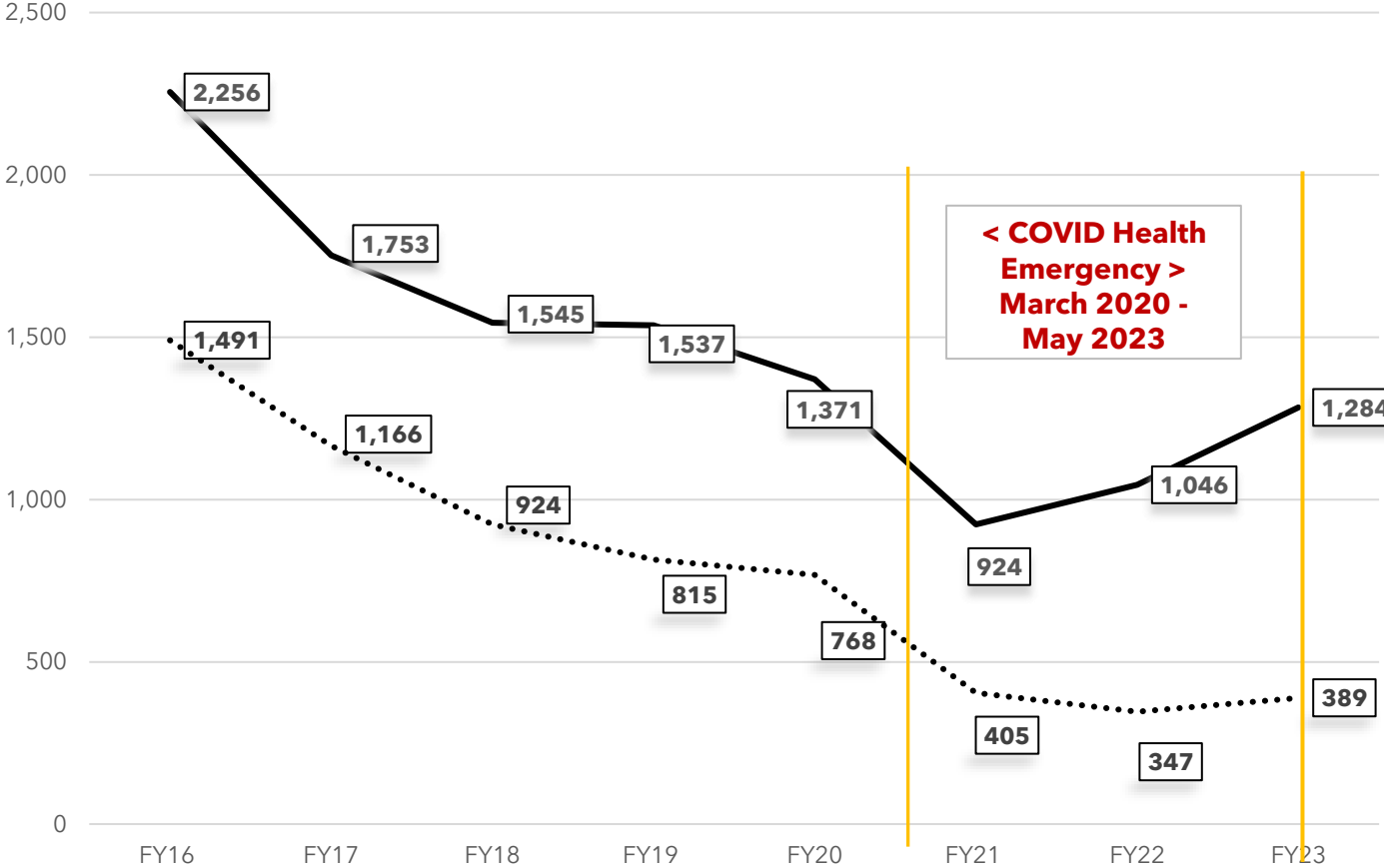

Family System

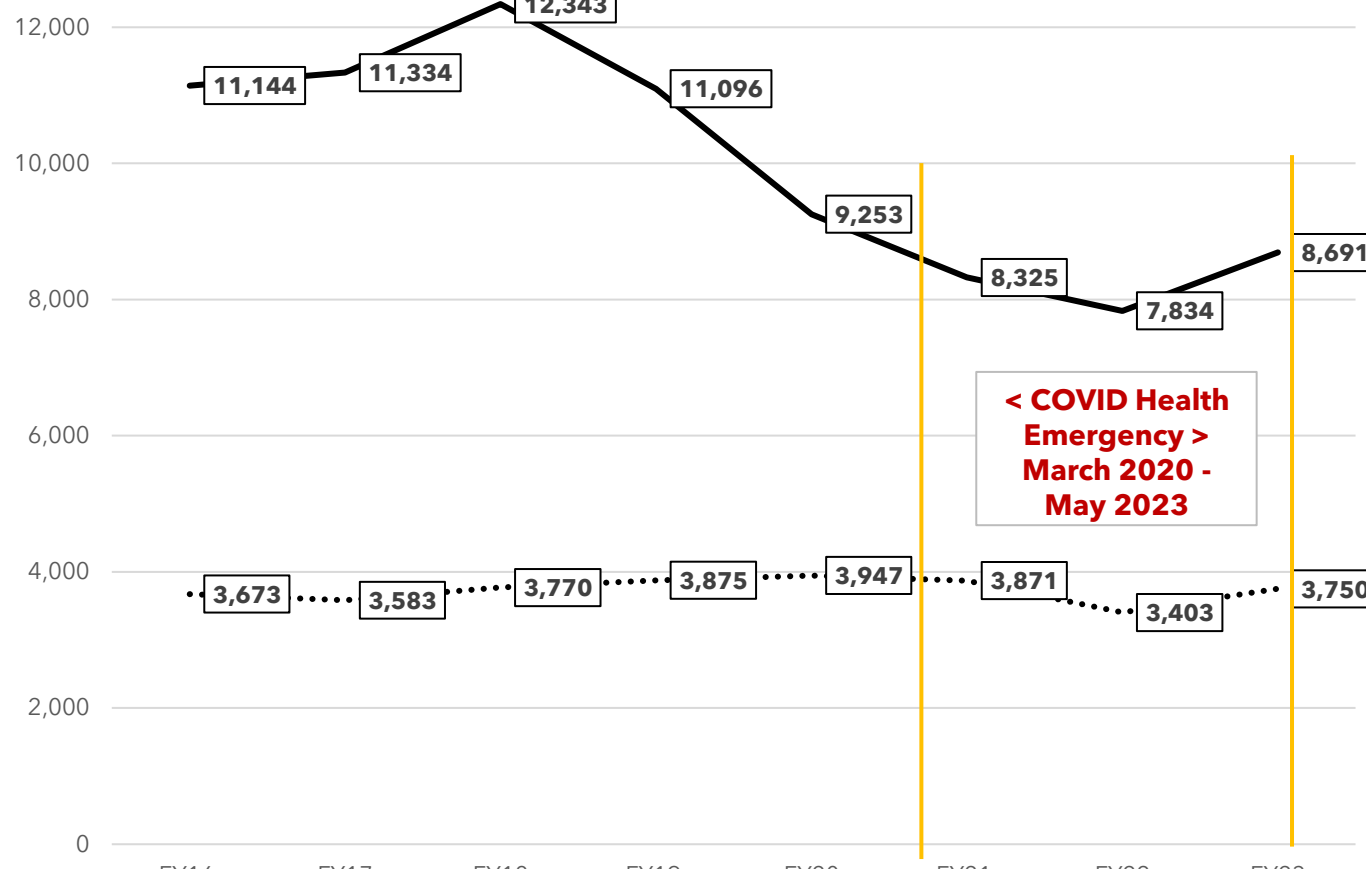
Families Served Throughout Fiscal Year & Families Served at PIT, FY16-23

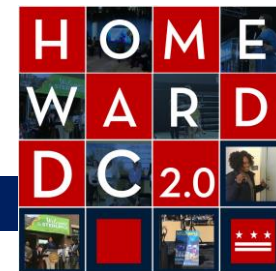

Assuming COVID protection measures and federal investments in recovery account for accelerated progress.

- ❖ **Q. What are the most salient challenges ahead of us as we are fully expending COVID-related resources? How can we further investigate our assumptions and preliminary observations about how COVID assistance has changed expectations?**

- ❖ **Q. Should we plan for a Point-In-Time Plus survey to mirror the Homeless Youth Count?**
Assuming the system has changed significantly, it may be appropriate to assess the following:
 - Re-examine the vulnerability of families experiencing homelessness,
 - Better understand the prevalence of migrants accessing homeless services, seeking residency in DC, etc.

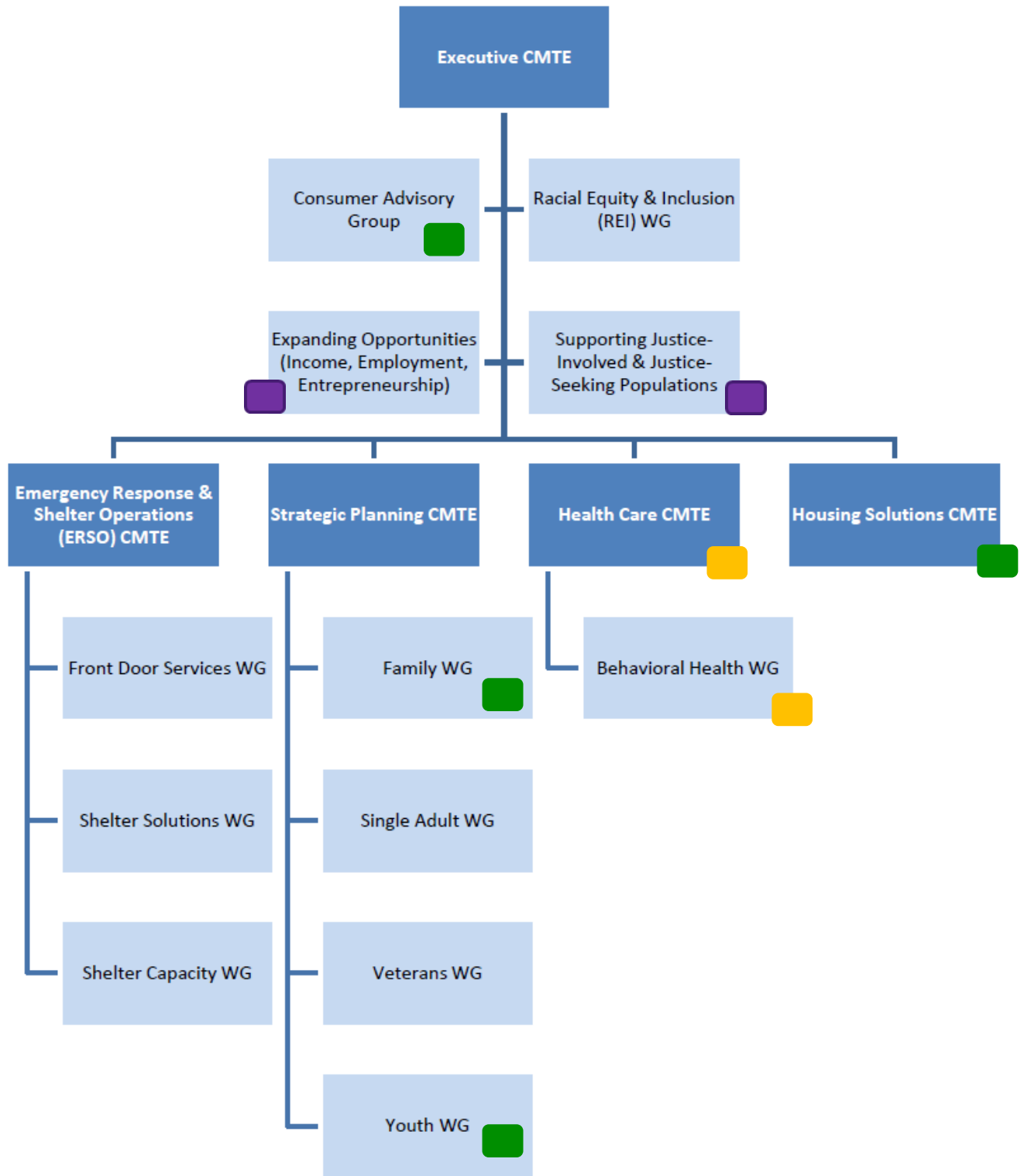

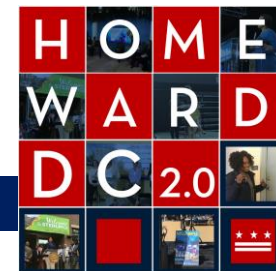

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Live Notes on Announcements



- ❖ **LZ (DHS):** Given the discussion on employment opportunities and the construction industry, highlighting opportunities from the Workforce Investment Council and relationship with advocates with lived experience at the Carpenters Union. Example of carpentry and how that ended homelessness. It is an amazing training center that works hard to connect people of all skill levels. I invited him to speak at a DHS provider meeting with SNAP employment providers. We want to get these opportunities out to our consumers. Still working on a date. Will send that out.
- ❖ **DH (DGS):** Underscoring the DHS announcement. Tremendous opportunities in the skilled trades. DGS is onboarding people who have gone through the training programs with DOES. The DC Infrastructure Academy is a game changer.
- ❖ **QA (PFFC):** Highlighting all of the work CM Nadeau has done with the vendors in Columbia Heights. How best can we support the youth working with vendors? Focus on entrepreneurship.
