Consolidated RFP Update



Request for Proposals Overview

- 28 applications received
 - Approx \$300M in gap financing requested
 - > 20 applications met Threshold Eligibility Requirements
- 9 projects selected for further underwriting
 - > \$78M in gap financing; \$2.3 in 9% LIHTC
 - > DHS and DCHA contracts parallel to DHCD process
 - 772 affordable units produced (261 units) or preserved
 (511 units)
 - > 107 Supportive Housing Units; 60 PSH units required to accept CAHP referrals and follow Housing First model
 - 155 Senior Housing units

Workforce & Homeless Services Alignment



- Working on data sharing agreement w/
 DOES to capture information on:
 - Wage receipt of clients experiencing homelessness
 - 2. Impact of participation in workforce services on housing status
 - Accessibility of workforce services (percentage of homeless services clients accessing workforce services)
 - Potentially a second data analysis project to compile information on skill level/barriers of homeless services population

Workforce & Homeless Services Alignment



- DHS reviewing staffing requirements in contracts with objective of creating more opportunities for peers/near peers
 - Working with DOES to explore certification course
- Reevaluating process for RRH matches (singles system) & examining work flow to create more intentional linkages to work beds and employment services
- Working with DOES to create more regular training opportunities for homeless services system providers.





Consumer Engagement Work Group



- Work Group Meets Monthly (4th Friday)
 - Focus has been standing up the committee & planning initial engagement events
 - ✓ Branding (t-shirts, cards)
 - ✓ Information materials (FAQ documents)
 - > Have conducted two engagement events to date
 - √ To collect feedback on the winter plan
 - ✓ Getting a feel for which forums work best
 - Next event will be focused on RRH for single adults
 - Committee co-chairs should be thinking about issues where consumer feedback is needed





Consumer Engagement Work Group



- Stipend process for appointed ICH consumer representatives has been developed
- Appointed reps receive stipend for attending assigned committee/work group meetings and monthly consumer engagement event
 - Each consumer rep will select two committees
 - He/she is responsible for attending the monthly committee meeting and any work group meetings under the committee
- Receives a \$50 stipend for each meeting/event
- Can choose gift cards (\$600 limit) or cash/electronic payment through DOES (no limit, but must file tax paperwork)





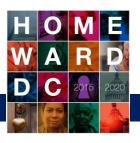

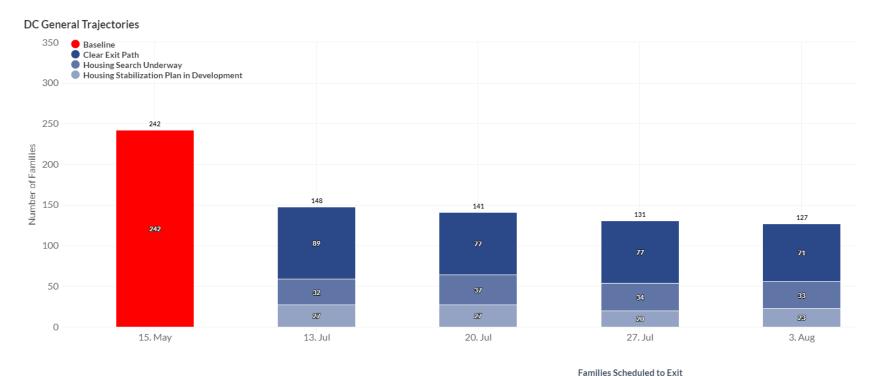




DC General Closure Update

- ❖ DC General Census 8/10/18: 102 families

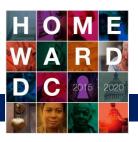

2018-19 Winter Plan Development



- Debrief sessions held in April & May
- Capacity needs developed by Shelter Capacity
 Work Group in June
- Draft plan presented to ERSO Committee in July
 - No major operational changes this year
- \star Final plan will be presented to ERSO on 8/22
- Will go before full Council for approval in September





2018 Homeless Youth Census



- Youth Count DC is an annual, District-wide effort to collect information on the scope and scale of homelessness and housing insecurity among young people (< age 25) living in the District</p>
 - Helps inform Solid Foundations DC and resource planning and allocation
- Friday, September 21st to Saturday, September 29th
 - Kick-off Event Scheduled for Friday! (details TBD)





2018 Homeless Youth Census



- * "Through the Eyes of Youth" (Youth Advisory Board) Planning Support:
 - Drafted Promotional Materials
 - Website Development
 - Review Survey Tool
 - Serve as Peer Reviewers and Promote the Event
 - Support Kick-Off Event and Magnet Events





2018 Homeless Youth Census



- Working Collaboratively with Partners:
 - Partner Agencies administering surveys and sharing data where possible
 - Outreach teams partnering with Youth Outreach
 - Magnet Events
- Volunteer Opportunities:
 - Administer Surveys
 - Promote the Homeless Youth Census via listservs etc.

- The HUD Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is the primary federal funding source for homeless services
- The District's portfolio of HUD CoC Program grantees is predominantly PSH, with some RRH, and priority population TH (i.e., youth)
- More than \$21 million in HUD CoC funding is renewed annually







- The DCICH serves as the CoC Board and approves the application, sets priorities for funding, and conducts the ranking:
 - > This function is delegated to the Ranking Committee
- The Ranking Committee met 4 times to review the program-level performance metrics and justification letters for CoC funded programs to determine the placement of each in the CoC's Priority Listing







- Also considered in Ranking Committee discussions:
 - Population served by the program;
 - Needs and vulnerabilities of the persons/populations served by the project;
 - Prioritizing of eligible participants for the project through CAHP; and
 - Projects' practices and their alignment with Housing First principals.







- The Workgroup also selected a project to include as the CoC's response to the Permanent Housing Bonus and DV Bonus housing opportunities:
 - DV Bonus: House of Ruth Joint TH-RRH Project Proposal
 - Permanent Housing Bonus: Community Connections Joint TH-RRH prioritizing Unaccompanied Youth







Final Steps:

- TCP notifies providers of the CoC Board's Decisions about Inclusion in Consolidated Application, Final Ranking in the Project Listing, and Decisions about Bonus Project Proposals
- September 18, 2018: Final Consolidated Application Submitted to HUD
