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Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Youth Homelessness

Office of Children's Emergency
Housing and Supportive Services
March 2017

- The HUD Continuum of Care (HUD CoC) Program is the primary federal funding source of homeless services
- **\$24 million** to support 52 new and renewing Permanent Supportive Housing, Rapid Rehousing, Joint Transitional–Rapid Rehousing, and Youth Transitional Housing programs, as well as funding for HMIS operations and CoC planning

FY18 HUD CoC Program Competition - Update



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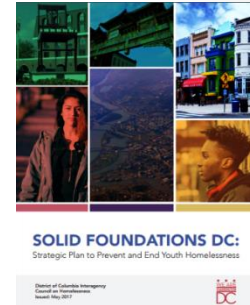


The DC Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH), is the **CoC**. It reviews the application, sets priorities for funding, and conducts the ranking and new project selection.

Ranking Committee: A Committee of non-conflicted DCICH members and CoC stakeholders convened to review the data that informed the preliminary ranking, cover letters, justification letters, etc. to determine final ranking. Representatives of the following agencies and organizations made up this year's Ranking Committee:

- DC Fiscal Policy Institute,
- DC Alliance of Youth Advocates,
- District of Columbia Interagency Council on Homelessness,
- District of Columbia Office of State Superintendent of Education-Re-Engagement Center,
- Downtown DC Business Improvement District,
- Washington Legal Clinic for the Homeless,
- National Law Center on Homelessness and Poverty,
- Center for American Progress, and
- DC Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

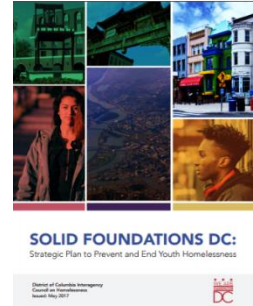
FY18 HUD CoC Program Competition - Update



The FY 2018 NOFA included two opportunities to apply for new funding:

- Permanent Housing Bonus, and
- Domestic Violence Bonus

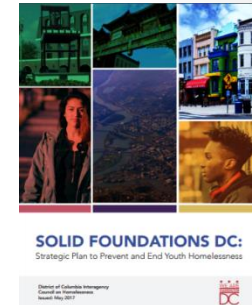


Permanent Housing Bonus

- The CoC applied for **\$1,276,661** under the Permanent Housing Bonus.
- The CoC selected a Joint TH-RRH program for unaccompanied youth. The proposal was submitted by Community Connections and builds on the youth Rapid Rehousing program they brought online during the FY 2016 NOFA.

FY18 HUD CoC Program Competition - Update



Domestic Violence Bonus

- The CoC applied for \$1,109,807 under the DV Bonus.
- The CoC had the opportunity to bring one new Joint TH-RRH program and one Rapid Rehousing Program for survivors of domestic violence.
- We received one proposal from House of Ruth for Joint TH-RRH and TCP submitted a proposal for Rapid Rehousing. If awarded TCP will issue an RFP to select a provider for the Rapid Rehousing program.

FY 2017 YHDP Funding Awards

- On July 13, 2018, HUD announced \$43 million in funding to 11 communities to ending youth homelessness.

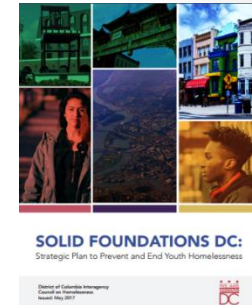

FY19 Winter Plan - Update

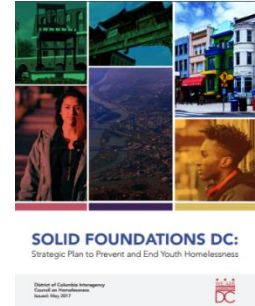


Overview

Youth System Capacity

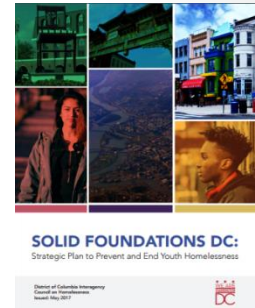
Minor Emergency Shelter: 25 beds
