
Icebreaker: Follow Up on VWFRC Eligibility



Purpose:

 Follow up on question from the 07/18 Youth Policy WG meeting regarding VWFRC policy and eligibility for pregnant persons.

Background/Context:

- Question from youth provider on eligibility for individuals who are 5 months pregnant.
- ICH followed up with DHS (Kia Williams) to confirm given policy update shared in April 2022 for pregnant individuals not yet in their 3rd trimester.
- Outcomes from referrals to VWFRC may include referral to prevention (HPP), low barrier shelter and/or family shelter.
 - Details from DHS outlined in the next few slides!




Overview

VWFRC launched an updated policy to serve pregnant individuals in first and second trimester who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. These services include guaranteed placement at low barrier shelter, without having to exit during the day and getting them connected to Homelessness Prevention Program (HPP) or family shelter, when needed.



Referral Is Received

- The VWFRC eligibility worker will complete an assessment for homeless services and will enter the household into HMIS.
 - > This will be a family entry
 - ➤ ADA request will be completed-if applicable
- Once the assessment is completed the household will be assigned to a Homelessness Prevention Program (HPP) site
 - ➤ Community of Hope (COH)
 - > Everyone Home DC
 - > MBI
 - > Wheeler Creek
- An HPP appointment will be scheduled within 24 to 48 hours of the referral. The
 appointment should include the Shelter Case Manager, HPP Case Manager, and the
 Household.





Reflections & Recommendations



Reflections:

- Emphasis on safety, including on event attendance and participation in the survey
- Case management
 - Feedback that case management is inconsistent and not persistent
 - > Approach matters! We have to meet clients where they are.
- Question about the purpose of programs targeting young adults if programs cannot meet the basic needs of young adults

Recommendations:

- Interest in expanding the survey to cover more programs and youth experiences
- Explore and understand options for outreach and youth engagement specialists to transport youth
- Map programs and think through safety routes and transportation options so that young adults do not have to navigate neighborhoods and streets where they are not safe



Feedback on SHY YAB Survey Presentation



- * **FDBK/Framing from DQ:** This makes a statement. Can see why the percentages are high. Agree why the mindset is important. Drawing connection between high % regarding safety and only 30% of respondents employed.
- Q from AH: Seems like this survey was mostly for individuals not yet housed. Of the youth who expressed that their basic needs are not being met, what percentage stays in TH or ETH?
 A: Will need to revisit the data to get this crosswalk.
 - Q: What questions were asked around employment?
 - A: Survey questions related to employment included below and ICH will distribute survey with the meeting notes for reference.
 - ✓ 23) Do you currently have a job?
 - o If Yes: How many hours do you work every two weeks? How long have you worked at your current job? How did you find your job? Do you feel like the money you earn can sustain you?
 - If No: When was your last job? Are you currently job hunting? What have been your barriers to employment?
 - ✓ 24) Have you ever been referred to employment/a job through a youth service provider? If yes, what was the job? If yes, was the job sustainable and could it lead to a career?
 - √ 25) How can the Youth System support young adults with employment or careers?
- Q: Do we know how many youth experienced homelessness as a result of family displacement/separation?
 - A: Primary reason of homelessness was not asked in this client survey but is collected in HMIS and Homeless Youth Count (HYC).




Feedback on SHY YAB Survey Presentation

 - A: This was a trial as part of the You Know Expo event on Youth Homelessness Matters Day 04/19. Will look for opportunities to expand!

- Q: How can we best assist youth understanding they may need more support or may be more vulnerable?
- * Q: Request for survey results to inform pursuit of employment program!
- Q: What is the gender identity breakdown for survey results?
- Q: This is helpful information, have you thought about joining with other groups that typically do surveys so that we can get a more representative sample of those served? My kids have been surveyed a number of times and not necessarily seeing the output.




Consolidate Youth mtgs to 1 monthly Youth CMTE mtg

- Fold monthly Youth Outreach WG into a monthly Front Door Services WG for Single Adults, Veterans, and Youth Subsystems
 - Appropriately recognizes that 40% of the youth experiencing homelessness access the Single Adult Subsystem
 - * CMTE members invited to 06/06 Front Door Services WG
- Consolidate monthly Youth Policy WG and quarterly Youth CMTE into one monthly CMTE meeting
 - Focused on ending and preventing youth homelessness
 - Fully leveraging youth-specific resources
 - *CMTE members invited to Youth Policy WG meetings in 05/16, 07/18



Expected Outcomes/Impact



Allows us to host additional CMTE/WGs critical to the Youth Subsystem

- We need to understand if the abysmal housing placement rates are a data quality issue or accurate.
- If accurate, we must understand whether this is an anomaly and why.
- Especially if the trend is consistent across all the years implementing Solid Foundations and YHDP, we need to course-correct!

- FDBK from JC: A lot of division of families make singles and youth and that is something that must change.
 - FDBK from RE: Agreed. Getting the youth help with resources while still in the family home should be a priority.

FDBK from LV:

- Important to provide information and/or access to employment support services about their rights and benefits like DOES office of wage and hour. Larry can share fact sheets used at DCOHR to present or distribute!
- Many migrant youth need something similar to an ID and some programs have printed out the ID from HMIS with a picture and name, and that helps a lot!
- Q: Results of the survey is sad. Have had a number of deaths related to fentanyl. Concerned • about substance use. Need the resources and policy to support solutions.
 - A from ICH: Emphasizes relevance of proposed Mortality Data WG for youth and young adults.
 - FDBK from DCNEXT!: Youth should not be limited to public transportation. Youth protection should be a top priority! Youth are harmed and exposed to many dangerous situation on public transportation.





- FDBK from RE: Personal experience shows need for resources and support as young as possible to reduce ongoing trauma. Interested to hear more from individuals are still working through trauma so can hear directly on what is needed.
 - A from ICH: We need to be sensitive to this ask and take special care in unpacking this idea. Can think more on what spaces are available to support this type of conversation.
 - FDBK from WG attendees: ABSOLUTELY agree having youth voice integrated more effectively in our work from brainstorm to implementation to evaluation. Care needs to given to not retraumatize youth or prey on their pain. There is a skill in strategic story telling.
- Q from CY: As we focus on housing, what type of housing are we considering or missing? Some clients enter program with the expectation that they will have permanent housing guaranteed at exit, but do not have income, etc. What are our options?
 - A from ICH: The goal is housing, not programs or facilities. Need to be focused on strategies to end homelessness.



- * FDBK from IH: Need to keep in mind the developmental and functional needs of young people. Interest in prioritizing employment and entrepreneurship.
 - > A from ICH: We are talking about the same end outcomes!
- Q: Are there unintended consequences that we should be thinking about?
 - A from ICH: Great question. We have received feedback that it is helpful to have smaller nimble groups to be responsive to system needs, though we need to be careful to not create or perpetuate silos.

FDBK from NB:

- As a person that was often called for lived Experiences feedback or "advisory". My comfortability to share fully depended on the space and the organization. Some made me feel like a test subject, others made me feel empowered.
- Rent reasonableness changes in areas impact ability to use vouchers. Even with resources we have through VWFRC and FRSP that can not be fully used due to rent reasonableness.
 - A from ICH: This is important feedback. We are tracking rent reasonableness in the Housing Solutions Committee and working with DCHA to understand its impact on subsidy and voucher programs as well as general affordability.



2023 HYC Plan

- No longer offering open survey link, all surveys must be completed with provider.
- Using administrative data sources for "count" and survey as a supplement to better understand the population based on Urban Institute recommendations.
- For agencies that cannot commit to actively survey youth, still need help advertising the count and sites where youth can complete the survey.
- Recruiting youth surveyors to assist at drop-in centers to help build capacity at those sites to ensure surveys are completed.

Survey Updates

What do you see as the priority areas for youth planning that we could get a better understanding of through the Youth Count survey?

- What are data that we don't have in HMIS?
 - Some examples: connections to resources, lifetime housing experiences, direct needs, understanding of barriers, etc.

 - Some examples: ageing out policy updates, exploration of different types of housing or services that may better fit for youth housing needs, etc.







DHS: FDBK on Proposed Youth Age Out Policy



Purpose:

* Remind community partners to share feedback on DHS proposed Age-Out Policy introduced at the 07/18 Youth Policy WG.

Background/Context:

- DHS is proposing 27 years old as the age that a person will no longer be eligible to reside in a youth bed.
- As of July 2023, about 18% (41 out of 225) of youth in unaccompanied singles programs (TH, ETH, and RRH) are over age 24.
- Focus on transitions to permanent destinations in a way that balances both a youth-centered approach with the reality that support is time-limited

Why Have an Age-Out Policy?

- To create a clear transition between the youth and the adult system
- To focus on transitions to permanent destinations in a way that balances both a youth-centered approach with the reality that support is time-limited
- Because HRSA allows program exits based on redetermination of eligibility and age is an allowable criteria
- To better facilitate system inflow and outflow and eliminate/reduce waitlist



What is the Age that Youth Will Age-Out?

- DHS is proposing 27 years old as the age that a person will no longer be eligible to reside in a youth bed
- This age is based on the length of stay for most DHS funded programs (2 years). A person placed in a youth bed at 24years/364 days would still be able to receive a full two years of service
- ETH programs initially contemplated youth who enter at 24 years/364 days would only receive programming for 2 years. This policy syncs with that intent.



Relevant Data Points

As of July 2023-

- About 18% (41 out of 225) of youth in unaccompanied singles programs (TH, ETH, and RRH) are over age 24
 - Seven youth are ages 27 or 28
 - The remaining 34 youth are 25 or 26 years old
 - 13 of the 34 youth are in ETH programs
 - 17 youth are in Transitional Housing Programs
 - 4 are in Rapid Rehousing Programs


