## District of Columbia's Strategic Action Plan to End Homelessness FY 2014 Annual Work Plan

In April 2010, the District of Columbia's Interagency Council on Homelessness (ICH) adopted the Strategic Action Plan to End Homelessness (Plan) to guide the District's activities to serve individuals and families experiencing homelessness over the next five years.

The FY 2014 ICH Annual Work Plan sets goals for the upcoming year that will help us achieve the overall goals of the Strategic Plan and that reflect the strategies the Plan considers essential to success: (1) more permanent housing; (2) increased collaboration between agencies; (3) public and private funding; and (4) monitoring of outcomes. The FY 2014 ICH Annual Work Plan builds on the successes realized through the FY 2013 Annual Work Plan.
